Historic \$1.5 B Investment in EPA's Brownfields Program

- President Biden signed "BIL" into law on November 15, 2021
- \$1.5 Billion over 5 years to EPA's Brownfields Program
 - \$1.2 B for projects authorized by Section 104(k)
 - \$300 M to carry out Section 128(a)





- \$1.5 B over 5 fiscal years (FY22 FY26)
 - \$300 M per year
 - \$240 M for projects authorized by Section 104(k)
 - \$60 M to carry out Section 128(a)

- We will still receive our regular appropriations in FY22 – FY26
 - 0 104(k) = ~\$370 M total (approp + BIL)
 - 128(a) = ~\$107 M total (approp + BIL)

- Up to 3% set-aside per year for salaries, expenses, and administration
- > 0.5% transfer to the Office of the Inspector General for oversight of the funding
- > Funds are held in Treasury and apportioned in equal amounts annually to the program through OMB
- Required to track and report to Congress on both Technical Assistance and Cooperative Agreement activities

Section 128(a) State and Tribal Response Program Funding

BIL says, "\$300,000,000 shall be to carry out Section 128 of [CERCLA]"



CERCLA 128(a) Authority

Who can receive 128(a) money?

CERCLA Section 128(a)* authorizes EPA to award a grant to a State (includes Island Territories and DC) or Indian Tribe that-

- Has a response program that includes each of the elements below, or is taking reasonable steps to include each of the elements, OR is a party to a MOA with EPA for their voluntary response programs
- Establishes a public record and updates at least once annually**

Elements in Section 128(a)(2)

- 1. Timely survey and inventory of brownfield sites;
- 2. Oversight and enforcement authorities or other resources that ensure response actions protect human health and the environment, are conducted in accordance with applicable laws, and are completed;
- 3. Mechanisms and resources to provide meaningful public participation; and
- 4. Mechanisms for approval of a cleanup plan and verification and certification that response is complete

*Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act, as amended (CERCLA), 42 USC 9628(a). Section 128(a) was added to CERCLA in 2002 by the Small Business Liability Relief and Brownfields Revitalization Act (Brownfield Amendments). ** CERCLA Section 128(b)(1)(C)



CERCLA 128(a) Authority

What can States and Tribes use this money for?

- May use these funds to "establish or enhance the response program of the State or Indian Tribe"*
 - Establish includes activities necessary to build the foundation for the four elements. For example, a state or tribal response program may use section 128(a) funds to develop regulations, ordinances, procedures, guidance, and a public record.
 - Enhancing includes activities that add to or improve a state or tribal response program or increase the number of sites at which response actions are conducted under such programs. Also includes developing and maintaining Institutional Controls/Engineering Controls tracking.
- Capitalize revolving loan funds for cleanup
- Purchase environmental insurance or develop other insurance mechanisms for brownfields cleanup activities
- As a matter of EPA policy, funds can be used for some limited site-specific work at Brownfield sites

Sample ideas for BIL funds to carry out Section 128(a) and strengthen Environmental Self Governance

- ✓ Build up Brownfields inventory and prioritize sites
 - \checkmark Contact KSU Tribal TAB for information on $\underline{\text{BiT}}$
 - ✓ May be helpful to coordinate with <u>HUD ONAP</u> for TA regarding tribal housing
- ✓ Paid internships or term positions (BIL funds are for 5 years)
- ✓ Develop or improve document management system
- ✓ Develop environmental codes, regulations, procedures, SOPs, etc. to assist in capacity-building and succession-planning
- \checkmark Continue great tribal mentoring and training
- \checkmark Build up community outreach and participation
- ✓ Build the capacity and process to verify that an assessment or cleanup was done properly and include documentation in the public record
- \checkmark Work with your EPA POs to discuss your ideas



Site-Specific Work

- Primarily, Section 128(a) funds are meant to establish or enhance response programs
- Site-specific activities are allowed on a limited basis
 - Must be a "Brownfield," as defined in CERCLA Section 101(39)
 - Must be related to establishing or enhancing the response program
- In current FY22 Guidance, funding is subject to 50% cap for site-specific work
 - Waiver requests to exceed 50% of allocation may be granted by headquarters with appropriate documentation from CAR and regional recommendation
 - Waiver process is outlined in funding guidance and Section IV.E. of the Terms and Conditions
